More Than a Journey – A Personal Mission for Change

We never planned to become "the couple that picks up trash around the world."

But one day, while traveling, we couldn't ignore what we saw — plastic on the beaches, waste in the forests, and silence around the issue. So we started picking it up. We filmed it. And to our surprise, people cared. Our videos went viral. Politicians reached out. Volunteers joined.

That's when we realized: sharing what we do matters just as much as doing it.

It was never just about the trash — it was about activating people. So this summer, we took it further.

We hitched across Europe — 4,781 km, 12 countries, 15 cleanups — to prove that you don't need a big budget to make a big difference. Just a message that resonates, the courage to act, and the willingness to connect.

Hitch for Change was more than just a travel journey.

We blended sustainable travel, environmental action, and community engagement to create real impact. By hitchhiking and carpooling, we reduced emissions and met incredible people along the way. By organizing cleanups, we removed waste — and showed that change can start anywhere, even by the side of the road.

We're not influencers. We're not tourists. We're people who believe that how we travel, what we consume, and how we act — matters.

And this journey changed us. We hope it changes something in you, too.






Commentary

The picked up trash mainly consisted of plastic items like bags, packagings and PET bottles. We were also regularly finding clothes. Nevertheless, the most frequent find were without any doubt the cigarette butts and tobacco pouches.

It is noteworthy to say that in countries with deposit system for some specific types of waste like cans, PET bottles or glass bottles, these items were very rare find which only confirms that the system works.

Unfortunately, the majority of the trash was not recyclable not only due to its nature but also due to contamination by dirt and its age and varying state of decomposition.

Most of the European countries, we visited, are on the same level in terms of general contamination with exception of Baltic countries – Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania which are definitely cleaner. Even the number of cigarette butts was lower.

All events were very similar in the terms of their organization. The information about the events were shared through our social media channels and channels of our partners. Plus, we shared the invites through platforms Facebook (local groups) and Couchsurfing (local hosts and visitors).

Every event started with a short talk about the contamination, the reasons behind the project and we also explained basic safety rules and how will we separate the trash, then 60-90 minutes cleanup followed by photo together and some content creation. The only exception was Helsinki where we organized 4 hours long cleanup with a station where people passing by could take the cleanup equipment and after a short briefing were set to go into a designated area (island Tervasaari and its surroundings) and after that brought what they picked up which is why in the final photo are only the last volunteers, not all 38.

We were incredibly happy to see the enthusiasm in all the volunteers many of whom had a change of the view of the overall contamination. Many volunteers in different place said in the beginning something like "I don't we will pick up a lot of trash, this place is always very clean" only to find out the sad reality if you look a bit closer and really focus on looking for trash.

Overall, we successfully showed the necessity of working together for better and cleaner future, promoted the sense togetherness and hope.


